

Session 4 Quiz (Rules 7-8) - ANSWERS

- 1.a. TRUE. Rule 7.2. As long as the ball may be positively identified, an identifying mark is not a requirement.
 - b. FALSE. Rule 7.3 An announcement of intention is no longer required by a player.
 - c. FALSE. Rule 7.1 Excessive actions may lead to a penalty
 - d. FALSE Rule 7.4 The original ball must be used in replacing a ball.
 - e. TRUE. Rule 7.1a If the search is done fairly, breaking a branch would not be a penalty
2. B. He may lift the dropped ball and place it on the estimated spot with no penalty.
Rule 7.4 absolves Todd from penalty during search, however since the ball did not come to rest on the required spot, he must correct the error before making a stroke. This ball needs to be replaced. Had the ball come to rest on the spot and played, he would be penalized 1 stroke for replacing it in a wrong way. A stroke without correction would be a 2-stroke penalty under 14.2 for playing from a wrong place.
3. D. Doug is penalized 2 strokes and cannot avoid penalty by replacing the sand.
In Rule 8.1a, Items 1 and 2 may be corrected, but items 3-5 cannot be corrected. Once the sand was moved, he gets the general penalty.
4. C. 2-Stroke penalty for improving the conditions affecting the stroke. Rule 8.1a. Just because a different stroke was played, the penalty is not avoided..
5. A. A player may move sand in a penalty area in searching for a ball
In B, there are accidental acts that would not result in a penalty
In C, the player has many options when the ball is in play in the teeing area
In D, replacing a divot in a relief is a violation of Rule 8.1a(3)
6. Which of the following results in a penalty?
 - A. PENALTY. Rule 8.1b. A player is not necessarily entitled to see the ball.
 - B. PENALTY. Rule 8.1d(2) does not allow restoring when natural forces alter the lie.
 - C. NO PENALTY. Rule 8.3b penalizes if the act is deliberate.
 - D. PENALTY. Rule 8.1d(2) says a player cannot improve the line of play.
 - E. NO PENALTY. Rule 8.1b(5) allows a player to dig in the sand as long as it is reasonable
