

Session 10 Quiz (Rules 17-19) - ANSWERS

- 1.a. TRUE. Rule 17.1e(1). A player does not have an option to play the ball as it lies when the ball is in a no play zone.
 - b. TRUE. Rule 17.3 An embedded ball may only be given free relief in the general area.
 - c. FALSE. Definition of penalty area. The non-marked penalty area is treated as red.
 - d. FALSE. Rule 17.1 states a player may stand in the penalty area after relief.
2. **A. No penalty, this is allowed.** Rules 17.1b and 15.1a. Grounding her club is allowed and so is moving a loose impediment.
3. **C. 5.** Rules 17.1d(3), 14.3c(2) & 14.7a. She can drop on the putting green, but the ball must remain on the same area of the course as it first struck. When she played the ball from the fringe, although in her measured relief area, she got a 2-stroke penalty for playing from a wrong place.
4. **C. 8.** Rule 17.1e and Rule 14.7b. Each stroke played from a no play zone counts, with a 2-stroke penalty for each. The intervening act is the stroke, so both penalties are applied.
5. **C. He must lift the ball and re-drop in his original relief area, with the one stroke penalty applied.** Rules 17.1 and 14.5b(3). When a player has proceeded under the correct rule and dropped the ball in the right way into the relief area and a re-drop is required, he must proceed under the same rule AND relief option.
6.
 - a. FALSE. Rule 18.1. A player always may return to spot of the last stroke.
 - b. FALSE. Rule 18.2b. If a ball is lost in a penalty area and he is virtually certain the ball is in the penalty area, a player may proceed under any penalty area relief options, not just stroke and distance.
 - c. FALSE. Rule 18.3b. A provisional need to only be announced to a person, it does not matter whom.
 - d. FALSE. Rule 19.2c. The ball is in play and a re-drop is not necessary. He may drop again taking an additional penalty or play the ball as it lies.
 - e. FALSE. Rule 19.3a. In taking relief for an unplayable ball in a bunker, a player may only take the ball out of the bunker using the back-on-a-line procedure, or return to the spot of the original stroke.
